

FROM OUR STUDENT LEADERS

Since the start of term 2 the school leaders have been involved in many school tasks. One is school tours. At the moment, we are being trained and then training other pupils, to run school tours for families interested in sending their kids to Camelot Rise Primary School.

We have also started to look at the results of a Resilience Survey which was done by all students in Grades 5 and 6 earlier in the year. We found that an issue raised was the behaviour of students in and outside of the classroom. On the 7th of June the student leadership team had a meeting where we listed the poor behaviours which need to be acknowledged and acted upon. We are going to look at these, evaluate them, talk to teachers and work to eliminate these behavioural issues inside and outside the classroom.

REGIONAL LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

The field of education is always changing. With new research, experiences, a changing society and technology it is vital that schools are aware of the most up-to-date thinking and apply this in a way that meets the needs of the school community. Last Monday and Tuesday our Principal Class team (Mrs Korrily George, Ms Helen Thomas and Ms Tennille Anderson) attended the North Eastern Victorian Regional Leadership Conference. Leading speakers from around the world as well as excellent local practice was presented, and this provided a wonderful opportunity to discuss key concepts and ideas and how they relate to the Camelot school context.

Ms Thomas' favourite speakers were Dr Judy Halbert and Dr Linda Kaser from Canada. Their workshop was titled Meaningful Evidence for Substantive Change in Learner Agency. Ms Thomas' highlight was looking at seven learning principles from The Nature of Learning (Center for Educational Research and Innovation: OECD). This looked specifically at Learners being at the centre by asking students the following questions - Describe in your own words what you are learning about? Why is this learning important? Can you use a range of ways to demonstrate your learning? Can you self-manage independent learning times? Are you able to set specific learning goals and construct learning through active exploration?

Ms Anderson's favourite speaker was Associate Professor Misty Adoniou as she enlightened her about the importance of teaching language explicitly from Foundation to Level 10. She inspired with her example of retelling the story to students prior to exploring the text in more detail with students. Tennille is looking forward to bringing some of Misty's expertise and advice to the coaching work at Camelot Rise.

Mrs George appreciated the closing address by Dr Simon Breakspear which provided a support structure to bring together all of the learning from other workshops, keynote addresses and learning labs from the conference. There are many ideas in education but Simon highlighted and emphasized the importance of focusing on the right work, in the right context and using the right structures to best support the learning of staff and students. "Right stuff, small steps and keen focus".



OUT OF SCHOOL HOURS NEWS
