
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

Principal's Report

Assistant Principal's Report

Dear Parents and Carers,

At Camelot Rise we are committed to proving parents with written reports for all students twice a year. These reports are a great way for teachers to update parents on the progress of their children. This term will be no different. Our Semester Two reports will be made available to parents on Friday, 10th December 2021 at 4pm.

In recognition of the disruption caused by COVID-19 that has dominated a large portion of the semester, the Department of Education and Training has adjusted the expectations around student reports for Semester 2, 2021. This advice considers the impact on both student engagement and the limitations on the ability of teachers to accurately assess student learning and progress during this challenging time.

As such, reports will look a little different.

The report will include a Generalist Comment, which will consider both the Onsite and Remote learning period. This will include information about work habits, engagement during remote learning and their transition back to onsite learning.

The report will also include an overview of what has been taught in English and Mathematics, and will include the following:

o student achievement information represented on a continuum of learning

- progress made since the last time these curriculum areas were reported on (Semester 1)
- o a five-point scale. This will come out in the form of a letter from A E.

Students will be placed on an English as an Additional Language (EAL) report if they fall into the following categories:

- Comes from a language background other than English
- Does not speak English as the main language at home

If you have any questions concerning your child's report, or if you would like a printed and/or signed copy of this report please contact your child's teacher.



High ability Program Maths and English

Congratulations to Adarsh, Dihain and Drew for successfully completing the High Ability Program for Maths in term 3. The program continued through Remote Learning and the students excelled in showing their own responsibility to extend their learning.

To give you insight into the English program, some of our past participants have shared parts of the texts they created:

VHAP English summary by Josh and Emma

Throughout VHAP English we studied the hero's journey, which is a step-by-step guide to what any story/book series with a hero should follow. We participated in VHAP English on Friday every week for 10 weeks in term 2, learning lots about the hero's journey, the archetypes of the hero's journey, the history of writing/English and all around how to improve

our writing. We met lots of new people and had lots of fun. I'm very sure that everyone who participated in VHAP English will have lots to take away from it.

Here are some samples of what students created.

A visual description:

This house is small, simple, just a one-story house. It looks like something you would forget after looking at it for one second. Although this house occasionally will look neglected and empty, if you take the time to venture inside, you will discover that things are not always what they seem. Instead of a perfect, calming scene, you will see bright paintings, stuffed animals, and bags of chocolate everywhere. Past the happy, cozy, room though, you will find a dark room, full of doubt and fear. (Min)

Beginning the story:

"That's what you were told. But let me tell you the true history of man. Long ago, science had taken over the land. It was a great time, there was much land to share, and the air was fresh and clean. Then came the machines. The machines were things that did the humans things for them, and the humans got ever lazier. Then all of a sudden, the humans forgot how to make the machines. And just like that, the humans lost their power. But the machines had done their damage. The island we know today as Clop was once the highest peak in the world at 8849 meters above sea level. Now, it is all we have, because the sea levels rose with the fall of the machines. Then it slowed down and the sea levels don't move from where they are today." (Alaric)

Victorian Coding Challenge

In term 3, eight budding programmers from Year 5 and 6 joined thousands throughout the state to refine their coding skills. The Victorian Coding Challenge is run by the Mathematical Association of Victoria and promotes creative yet logical minds to solve problems. Our Year 6 students Jasper, Stephanie, Aris and Nicolas joined Drew, Aiden, Issey and Vibha from Year 5 to work through weekly challenges in Scratch. They showed persistence in working through the coding loops and demonstrated collaboration in finding solutions together.

We have a team of four moving to the second stage of the challenge to represent CRPS. Jasper, Aris, Nicholas and Drew will be coding from "scratch" (literally!) a design to enter a state wide competition. They have four weeks to design and create an application that meets the challenge brief. Good luck coders!

John Monash Science - Science

In term 2, four Year 5 students (Alysia, Vidya, Aidan and Drew) participated in the John Monash Science School program. The students investigated different fields of science on

each visit. On one visit students explored the laws of gravity and the forces at play in designing planes. They made paper planes and competed in "longest fliers" and "highest fliers". They then put their design skills together as a team to create a carrier which could safely deliver a raw egg dropped from a height of five metres to its landing spot.

Community News

Parking around the school

Parking is available along King Arthur Drive, Galahad Crescent and Avalon Avenue. Monash City Council Parking Inspectors regularly monitor the parking situation in Galahad Crescent. As the safety of all our students is our prime concern, we are pleased that the Council has taken this initiative to ensure that the parking restrictions are observed. When vehicles are stopped or parked too close to the crossing, the visibility of drivers approaching the school crossing is impaired and this places our students at risk. We ask parent's co-operation in keeping this area clear at all times.

Please remember that to maximise the safety of all our students (and community) it is important to observe and follow all guidelines in place at all times:

- There is a 2-minute drop-off zone in place, which means <u>2 minutes maximum</u>.
 Vehicles are not to be left unattended.
- There is a Permit Only Zone in front of the staff carpark. Please do not park here unless you have a permit.
- Abide by all road rules
- Use the crossings provided (manned or not) to cross the road
- Ensure children exit the car on the footpath side
- Encourage your children to stand on the footpath not on the road when leaving the car
- · Be patient and respectful of other motorists



You can now Decline events on Compass

If for some reason your child is unable to attend an event there is now a Decline button on Compass. Please use this function if required for future events.



How to Reset Compass Password

If you require assistance with logging into Compass, you may have tried your password more than 3 times and Compass will lock you out of the system as a security measure. Please wait approximately 30 minutes and try again.



If you are still not able to remember the correct password and are needing your password reset, you can do this via the Compass login screen.

By clicking this option you will be stepped through a series of questions including a request to enter your current email or mobile phone number. Compass will use the information to forward the reset details so you must be able to access your email / mobile phone. Please note, Compass will use the existing primary email or mobile on file for that user account for verification before completing a password reset for the user. If the mobile or email that they enter does not match what is on file they will not be able to proceed. For instances where it is Parent B of an account attempting to reset the password, the system will require Parent A's email/mobile as these details are considered the primary details for the household account.

If, after waiting 30 minutes and following the 'Cant access your account' instructions, please call or email the school office and we will attempt to assist you.
