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# From the Principal

### Teacher Professional Practice Day

Student Free Day - Wednesday, 31st May.

Just a reminder that students are not required to attend school on Wednesday 31st May as this is day is a 'Teacher Professional Practice Day' at Camelot Rise Primary School.

Professional practice days provide teachers with release from their scheduled duties (all duties which would have been otherwise scheduled, including teaching) to focus on the improved delivery of high-quality teaching and learning.

The Victorian Government Schools Agreement 2022 provides teachers with three professional practice days in 2022, two professional practice days in 2023 and one professional practice day in 2024 and beyond.

This date and all other Student Free Days were approved by School Council in 2022 and these dates have been communicated with families in every newsletter.

The only students that will be attending school on this day are the Year 5 students that leave to commence their camp to Sovereign Hill on that day.

Camp Australia will be providing a service on this day for any families that require their child/children to be looked after.

Students are not required at school on Wednesday 31st May (except for the Year 5 students that are attending the Sovereign Hill Camp).

### Student Mental Health and Wellbeing

onPsych mental health and counselling is available at our school!

Do you find that your child is having emotional or behavioural issues? Are they struggling socially, academically? Camelot Rise Primary School has a registered psychologist to support your child.

Luke Simmons is a registered psychologist who specialises in child and adolescent mental health. His services are provided at the school at NO OUT OF POCKET COST through Medicare bulk billing or NDIS. He will work collaboratively with you, your child, and the teachers to maximise opportunities for positive growth.

## Reading is everything

As the colder months descend on us and the days get shorter, there is no better time to grab a book and curl up under the doona or in front of the fire. By any measure, reading for more than 15 minutes per day has enormous benefits for life outcomes. Fifteen plus minutes of active reading helps students achieve higher academic growth than their peers. 30 minutes is even better, and 60 minutes has enormous benefits.


Studies show that only 18% of students read for 30 minutes per night and that at 60 minutes, student growth is on average 48% higher than the average, no matter what the child's background. The table also shows the correlation between high reading engagement against international student rankings. Those coming from the lowest



socioeconomic backgrounds achieve well above the international average if they read regularly. If we compare a student from a low socioeconomic background who does not read daily, with a student from a high background that does, the difference is massive. That difference is cut dramatically by high reading engagement. The evidence could not be clearer. If you want your child to succeed, read to them and give them plenty of opportunities to read.

If you still have pre-schoolers, the research shows how significant being read to is, enabling students to start school with reading skills well above their peers. From my own experience, when my own children wanted to stay up later, our first negotiation led to bedtime being extended by 30 minutes, on the proviso that they read in bed for those 30 minutes. Not only did it help them fall asleep as they disconnected from devices, but it boosted their reading time. Win-win-win! As I have said many, many times, reading is everything and is the key to your child enjoying a successful future.

I have included an article below that further outlines the importance of reading daily.



#### WHY READING EVERY NIGHT IS SO IMPORTANT:

The following article again illustrates just how important the practice of reading nightly is.

#### Why Can't I Skip My Twenty Minutes of Reading Tonight?

(Source Unknown)

#### Let us figure it out -- mathematically!

- Student A reads 20 minutes five nights of every week;
- Student B reads only 4 minutes a night...or not at all!

Step 1: Multiply minutes a night x 5 times each week.

- Student A reads 20 min. x 5 times a week = 100 mins. /week
- Student B reads 4 minutes x 5 times a week = 20 minutes

Step 2: Multiply minutes a week x approximately 4 weeks each month.

- Student A reads 400 minutes a month.
- Student B reads 80 minutes a month.

Step 3: Multiply minutes a month x 9 months/school year

Student A reads 3600 min. in a school year.

Student B reads 720 min. in a school year.

- Student A practices reading the equivalent of ten whole school days a year.
- Student B gets the equivalent of only two school days of reading practice.
- By the end of Year 6 if Student A and Student B maintain these same reading habits,
   Student A will have read the equivalent of 60 whole school days.
- Student B will have read the equivalent of only 12 school days.

One would expect the gap of information retained will have widened considerably and so, undoubtedly, will school performance.

How do you think Student B will feel about him/herself as a student?

#### Some questions to ponder:

- Which student would you expect to be the more proficient reader?
- Which student would you expect to know more?
- Which student would you expect to write with greater proficiency?
- Which student would you expect to have a broader vocabulary?
- Which student would you expect to be more successful in school....and in life?

This morning the school opened it's doors for the community. Thank you to those who attended.









## CSEF applications for 2023

CSEF applications for 2023 are now open and must be submitted to the school office by 16th June 2023. The CSEF provides payments to assist eligible families to cover the costs of camps, sporting activities and excursions. Payments are made directly to an eligible student's school. Schools must use a CSEF payment only for the eligible student and not for that student's siblings. Some common examples of school-organised programs for which a CSEF payment may be used include:

- school camps/trips
- swimming and other school-organised sporting programs
- outdoor education programs
- excursions/incursions.

The CSEF payment cannot be used towards:

- books
- stationery
- school uniforms
- before/after school care
- music lessons
- locker hire
- classroom and homework materials
- graduations and formals
- other expenses unrelated to camps, sports or excursions.

## Parking around the school

Parking is available along King Arthur Drive, Galahad Crescent and Avalon Avenue. Monash City Council Parking Inspectors regularly monitor the parking situation in Galahad Crescent. As the safety of all our students is our prime concern, we are pleased that the Council has taken this initiative to ensure that the parking restrictions are observed. When vehicles are stopped or parked too close to the crossing, the visibility of drivers approaching the school crossing is impaired and this places our students at risk. We ask parent's co-operation in keeping this area clear at all times.

Please remember that to maximise the safety of all our students (and community) it is important to observe and follow all guidelines in place at all times:

- There is a 2-minute drop-off zone in place, which means <u>2 minutes maximum</u>.
   Vehicles are not to be left unattended.
- There is a Permit Only Zone in front of the staff carpark. Please do not park here unless you have a permit.
- Abide by all road rules
- Use the crossings provided (manned or not) to cross the road
- Ensure children exit the car on the footpath side
- Encourage your children to stand on the footpath not on the road when leaving the car
- Be patient and respectful of other motorists


#### Scholastics Book Club



### You can now Decline events on Compass

If for some reason your child is unable to attend an event there is now a Decline button on Compass. Please use this function if required for future events.



### How to Reset Compass Password

If you require assistance with logging into Compass, you may have tried your password more than 3 times and Compass will lock you out of the system as a security measure. Please wait approximately 30 minutes and try again.



If you are still not able to remember the correct password and are needing your password reset, you can do this via the Compass login screen.

By clicking this option you will be stepped through a series of questions including a request to enter your current email or mobile phone number. Compass will use the information to forward the reset details so you must be able to access your email / mobile phone. Please note, Compass will use the existing primary email or mobile on file for that user account for verification before completing a password reset for the user. If the mobile or email that they enter does not match what is on file they will not be able to proceed. For instances where it is Parent B of an account attempting to reset the password, the system will require Parent A's email/mobile as these details are considered the primary details for the household account.

If, after waiting 30 minutes and following the 'Cant access your account' instructions, please call or email the school office and we will attempt to assist you.

# Privacy Information



### Privacy Collection Notice for parents and carers

The Department of Education (the department) values your privacy and is committed to protecting the personal and health information that schools collect.

All school staff must comply with Victorian privacy law and the <u>Schools' Privacy Policy</u>. This notice explains how the department, including Victorian government schools (schools), handles personal and health information. On occasion, specific consent will be sought for the collection and use of information, for example, for a student to receive a health service. Our schools are also required by legislation, such as the *Education and Training Reform Act 2006*, to collect some of this information.

Throughout this notice, 'staff' includes principals, teachers, student support service officers, youth workers, social workers, nurses and any other allied health practitioners, and all other employees, contractors, volunteers and service providers of the school and the department.

On enrolment, and during the ordinary course of a student's attendance at a school, schools will collect information about students and their families for the following purposes:

- educating students
- · supporting students' social and emotional wellbeing, and health
- fulfilling legal obligations, including duty of care, anti-discrimination law and occupational health and safety law
- communicating and engaging with parents
- student administration
- · school management
- · supporting policy in relation to student education and wellbeing.

If this information is not collected, schools may be unable to provide optimal education or support to students or fulfil legal obligations.

For example, our schools rely on parents to provide **health information** about any medical condition or disability that their child has, medication their child may take while at school, any known allergies and contact details of their child's doctor. If parents do not provide all relevant health information, this may put their child's health at risk.

Our schools also require current, relevant information about all **parents and carers** so that schools can take account of safety concerns that affect their children. Parents should provide schools with copies of all current parenting plans and court orders about or that affect their children and provide updated copies when they change.

When parents enrol their child in primary school, they will be asked to provide personal and health information in several ways, including via the Enrolment Form, the <u>School Entrance Health Questionnaire</u> (SEHQ) and the <u>Early Childhood Intervention Service</u> (ECIS) Transition Form.

The **Enrolment Form** is used to collect information that is essential for the purposes listed above, and requests information such as:

• **Emergency contacts** – Individuals parents nominate for a school to contact during an emergency. Parents should ensure that their nominated emergency contact

- agrees to their contact details being provided to the school and that they understand their details may be disclosed by the department if lawful, e.g. in the case of emergency communications relating to bush fires or floods.
- Student background information Information about country of birth, Aboriginal or
  Torres Strait Islander origin, language spoken at home and parent occupation. This
  information enables the department to allocate appropriate resources to schools.
   The department also uses this information to plan for future educational needs in
  Victoria and shares some information with the Commonwealth government to
  monitor, plan and allocate resources.
- Immunisation status This assists schools to manage health risks and legal
  obligations. The department may also provide this information to the Department of
  Health and Department of Families, Fairness and Housing to assess immunisation
  rates in Victoria, but not in a way which identifies students.
- Visa status This is required to process a student's enrolment.

All schools may use departmental systems and online tools such as apps and other software to effectively collect and manage information about students and families for the purposes listed above.

When schools use these online tools, they take steps to ensure that student information is secure. If parents or carers have any concerns about the use of these online tools, please contact the school.

School staff will only share student and family information with other school staff who need to know to enable them to educate or support the student as described above. Information will only be shared outside the school (and outside the department) as required or authorised by law, including where sharing is required to meet duty of care, anti-discrimination, occupational health and safety, and child wellbeing and safety obligations. The information collected will not be disclosed beyond the school and department without parent consent unless such disclosure is lawful.

When a student transfers to another school (including Catholic, independent and interstate), personal and/or health information about that student may be transferred to the next school. Transferring this information is in the best interests of the student and assists the next school to provide the best possible education and support to the student. For further detail about how and what level of information is provided to the next school, refer to the:

Enrolment: Student transfers between schools

Schools only provide school reports and ordinary school communications to students, parents, carers or others who have a legal right to that information. Requests for access to other student information or by others must be made by lodging a <u>Freedom of Information</u> (FOI) application.
