Assistant Principal Report



Student Safety

As we are getting closer to the end of what has been a very busy and productive term (not to mention a rather cold & wet one too!) it remains the responsibility of all of us, as teachers, as parents and for the students themselves, to help ensure that everyone remains safe and enjoys the reward of a fun and relaxing holiday in just under a fortnight's time. This is especially vital, given that we have our Production week this week, followed by Planning next in the last week of term, combined with the fact that students are usually already rather tired towards term's end.

With that in mind, we urge all families to have a talk about the following specific safety concerns related to the use of bicycles and scooters that have arisen recently and how parents and students can act in ways that minimise the risk of injuries or unpleasant incidents:

Riding to and from school

Each day, several students take the option of riding their bike or scooter to school, which is to be encouraged, as long as it is done so safely. Students from Levels 3 to 6 who are competent riders or scooters usually ride or scoot, without being accompanied by an adult. For students in Foundation to Level Two that are riding to school, it is a requirement that they be accompanied by an adult. It also critical that these younger students don't ride off ahead of the supervising adult, as it diminishes the level of supervision that can be realistically be provided. Road safety authorities recommend that before the age of nine or ten years children should not ride a bicycle in traffic without adult supervision. Depending on their cycling skills and experience, some children over this age may still require supervision. Children under the age of twelve may ride on footpaths, as may a supervising adult. They are required to give way to pedestrians and to wheel their bicycles over pedestrian and children's crossings. Children aged twelve years or older are required by law to ride on the road.



Bikes and scooters in the schoolyard:

Those students that do ride or scoot to school must know and understand that they have a responsibility for their own safety, and that of others, on their journey to and from school. However, they also have a responsibility to themselves and others, to act safely once they enter the school grounds with their bike or scooters. Any student arriving at school on a bike or scooter must dismount at a safe distance from the school gate or school crossing area (around 10 metres), and then walk their bike or scooter to the bike rack. Similarly, those students who are riding or scooting home must also walk their scooter or bike all the way through the school until they have passed through the gate, after which they may mount their bike or scooter and make their way home


Families whose children either ride or scoot to school are reminded that the law requires that that they wear an approved bicycle helmet. Approved helmets have the Australian Standards Mark TM (AS/NZS 2063) and will be marked as suitable for cycling.

EVERY COUNTS

Primary school attendance

Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education. Students learn new things at school every day missing school puts them behind.

Why it's important

We all want our students to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school each and every day.

If students miss school regularly, they miss out on learning the fundamental skills that will set them up for success in the later years of school.

There is no safe number of days for missing. school- each day a student misses puts them behind, and can affect their educational outcomes.

Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achievement in numeracy, writing and reading.

Getting in early

Attendance patterns are established early- a child regularly missing days in kindergarten or in the early years of school will often continue to miss classes in the latery ears, and receive lower test scores than their classmates. It's vital that. students go to school every day - even in the early years of primary school.

What we can do

The main reasons for absence are-

Sickness - There are always times when students need to miss school, such as when they're ill. it's vital that they're only away on the days they are genuinely sick, and setting good sleep patterns, eating well and exercising regularly can make a big difference.

It's vital that holidays are planned during school holidays where possible, and not during the term if it can be avoided.

"Day off" - Think twice before letting your child have a "day off" as they could fall. behind their classmates - every day counts.

Truancy - This is when students choose not to go to school without their parent's permission. There can be many reasons for truancy. The bestway to address this is for schools and parents to work together.

If for any reason your child must miss school, there are things you can do with your school to ensure they don't fall behind-

Speak with your classroom teacher and find out what work your child needs to do to keep up.

Develop an absence learning plan with your teacher and ensure your child. completes the plan.

Remember, every day counts. If your child must miss school, speak with your classroom teacher as early as possible.

Openly communicating with your child's school about all absences is a good way to prevent attendance issues being escalated to a School Attendance Officer. A School Attendance Officer is a Department of **Education and Training Regional Director** who has authority to follow up attendance issues. Attendance issues that are escalated can lead to an infringement Notice.

If you're having attendance issues with your child, please let your class room teacher know so we can work together to get your child to school every day.



If your child/ren are going to be away or have been away from school, please enter their absence details via Compass.



Student is kept away from school for a religious or cultural reason.



Having the flu is even more likely if you have been in contact with someone who already has it, or have had some other type of exposure such as overseas travel to areas where flu outbreaks are occurring.

A doctor can only confirm whether you have the flu or another kind of virus after a nose or throat swab has returned positive results. The treatment is similar for any 'flu-like' illness, but a diagnosis is useful in helping health officials track disease patterns and frequency and will be required where complications have developed.

The most common symptoms of the flu are:

- sudden appearance of a high fever (38 °C or more)
- a dry cough
- body aches (especially in the head, lower back and legs)
- feeling extremely weak and tired (and not wanting to get out of bed).

Other symptoms can be:

- chills
- aching behind the eyes
- loss of appetite
- sore throat
- runny or stuffy nose.

CRPS old uniform recycling drive

Each year tonnes of clothes and textiles end up in landfills, but as much as 95% could be used again. 6BM have decided to run a clothing donation drive for all the old Camelot Rise School uniforms what will not be worn again in 2018 when new uniform changes take effect.





With some research, we have discovered that the clothing company H&M has a garment collecting initiative, which has been created to decrease clothing waste.




6BM along with the Uniform Shop are running clothing drive where you can donate your old school uniforms and any other unwanted clothes. They will then be taken to a H&M store to be donated for recycling.

You will be able to donate your old school uniforms along with any other unwanted clothes and they will be taken to an H&M store to be donated for recycling.

Once the old garments have been dropped off in a store, the company I:CO collects and sorts them into three categories:

- Rewear clothing that can be worn again will be sold as second hand clothes.
- Reuse old clothes and textiles will be turned into other products, such as cleaning cloths.
- Recycle everything else is turned into textile fibres, and used for things like insulation.



We will be running this drive from Week 8 of Term 3 until Week 8 of Term 4. Marked boxes for collections will be located in the Library, Uniform Shop, Unit B, Unit D, 6BM & 4Hs classroom.

Every donation made will receive a raffle ticked to win a 15% off voucher to H&M. There will be a number of vouchers to be won. This will be drawn at the end of Term 4.


